

WINDOW ON A COMMUNITY: Nikkei Farmers of the Hood River Area (1 available)

Window on a Community is an exhibit curated by the Oregon Nikkei Legacy Center in 2007. The exhibit features seven panels that present and celebrate the early history of the first Japanese settlers in the area, the Hood River Issei (Issei=first generation), and their families.

The Nikkei community of Hood River was one of the largest and earliest established Japanese communities in the state of Oregon outside of Portland. Agriculture, including vegetable growing and fruit orchards, was a significant occupation for many area residents, and that proud tradition is still carried on today by many families. Visitors to the exhibit will learn about how the Hood River area Issei got started in early occupations, early starts in orchards, and the growth of the community.

INSTALLATION:

These are suggested installation methods for this exhibit, all installation hardware, furniture and/or consumable materials must be provided by the exhibiting institution.

- Wall installation: 4 large-size 3-M Command Strips per panel (panels already backed w/ strips)
- Easel installation: 7 large easel/presentation stands

SPECIAL OPTION:

Originally used in the inaugural exhibit, and for a more customized experience, a larger installation for this exhibit is available which utilizes actual wooden window frames for the exhibit panels. This option includes one additional introductory photographic panel and smaller aesthetic support elements. The installation requires hanging the frames on a wall with traditional picture hardware and will require higher shipping costs. Please call ONLC for more information on this installation option.

The following diagram is the suggested panel-order for this exhibit. It can easily be divided between multiple walls, though the primary exhibit-content is chronological in nature.



- Table-top display: Flat, open surface at least 26" wide x18" deep
- Easel display: 1 large display/presentation easel
- DVD display: TV/Monitor w/ standard DVD player (set to chapter repeat for a looped presentation)
- Bookmarks can be produced from standard copier/printer onto white card stock and manually trimmed
