“Oregon 2013 Teen Video Challenge” Submission Guidelines

Eligibility

The “2013 Teen Video Challenge” for Oregon is open only to legal U.S. residents who are residents of Oregon aged 13 -18. Participants are ineligible if directly related to the panel of judges for the contest. By participating, entrants agree to be bound by these Contest Rules. Each participant or group may submit one video per entry. Each entry must include signed model release form(s). All submissions must be received by Saturday, February 2. Late entries will not be accepted. A DVD of the video will be requested from the winner.

Terms and Conditions

All audio and artwork must be created by the entrant or be in the public domain and must be specified as such on the entry form. CSLP (and all CSLP member affiliates) have permission to use the “2013 Teen Video Challenge” submissions, including all work created and all intellectual property embodied therein, as per the Model Release form.

Video Criteria for Acceptance

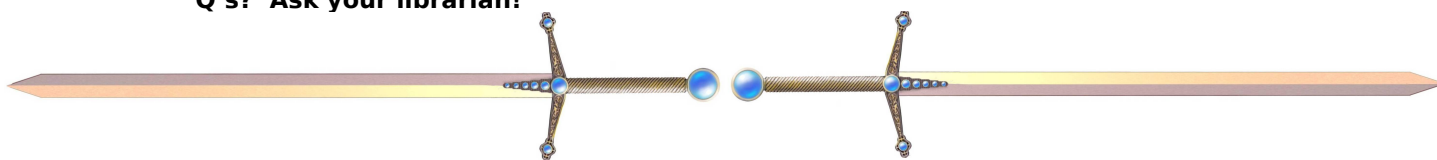
All videos must:

- Be 30 to 90 seconds in length.
- Promote the idea of using public libraries and reading.
- Include your interpretation of the 2013 CSLP teen slogan “Beneath the Surface.”
- Be designed for use at any library.
- Be appropriate for viewing by audiences of all ages.

Videos will be judged on the following criteria

- Creativity
- Message clarity and relevance
- Motivation and inspiration
- Overall impact

How to Enter

1. Go to www.cslpreads.org/challenge-overview.html for tips and info about the challenge.
2. **Create** your video
3. **Title** your video with: “2013 TVC - OR - Unique Name.” Please choose a unique name that does not include your real name.
4. **Upload** your video to **YouTube.com**.
5. **Fill out** and sign your completed Entry form & Model Release form(s) and
6. **Mail** completed forms (you signed them, right?) by **Saturday, February 2** to “2013 TVC” c/o CSLP Liaison / North Bend Public Library / 1800 Sherman Ave / North Bend, OR 97459; or scan the form and e-mail it to oyancslp@gmail.com.
Late entries will not be considered.

Entries will be posted on the YouTube channel at www.youtube.com/2013TVCOR. A panel of judges will select the winning video to represent Oregon.

Winners and Prizes

CSLP will review all state winners during March 2013. In the spring of 2013, CSLP will award each CSLP approved State Teen Video Challenge Winner \$275. Their Local Public Library will receive prizes worth \$125 from CSLP and Upstart.
